To deliver high-quality mathematics instruction for young children, the role of preschool teachers is indispensable. Preschool teachers' role in mathematics learning goes beyond being only knowledge transmitters. They serve as facilitators, mentors and motivators, aiding young learners in exploring and comprehending the mathematical concepts woven into their everyday experiences. It is imperative that preschool teachers possess a high self-efficacy in teaching mathematics, as research asserts that highly self-efficacious teachers use more developmentally appropriate practices in the classroom (McMullan, 1999). This session aims to boost preschool teachers' confidence and self-efficacy in teaching mathematics, making them feel great about their role in early mathematics education.
